# We have made some new changes

Our new pedestrian access is ready! If you use the Cob Drive entrance, you will have seen that we have some new fencing that enables us to allow pedestrian visitors to enter the school site from the path, which now has access to the office as well as the playground.



When accessing the school office before, during or after the school day via Cob Drive when the gates are locked, you will need to buzz the office using the right-hand intercom on the pedestrian gate (on the path). When a member of the team answers, please let us know who you are and why you are visiting and then the pedestrian gate will be released. You will need to push the gate, walk down the path and turn left. Continue through the low wooden gate and head to the office door (press the intercom if the door has not been released).

This access has been put in to improve the safety of our school community and visitors, whilst maintaining children's safety during break and lunchtimes. We will be continuing to make improvements to our school site for the benefit of all.



### **Rabbit Class update**



Rabbit Class have been looking at the story of Joseph and his Technicolour Dreamcoat as part of their RE lesson. The children worked in teams to create their own group dreamcoat and we think they look pretty good.

### **Update from Hedgehog Class**

Hedgehog Class have engaged brilliantly with our history learning about Christopher Columbus. The children have retained so much information - we are sure they will be able to teach other children amazing facts about Christopher Columbus as well as other modern explorers. Everyone had lots of fun learning about the different foods and spices explorers wanted to bring back to Europe. We decided to mix Paprika with PVA glue and used this mixture to paint the red cross found on the sail of Christopher Columbus' ship – the Santa Maria.





Hedgehog Class have been inspired by their class book this term, **Wanted: The Perfect Pet** by Fiona Roberton.

The story has promoted wonderful conversations about pets as well as lots of discussion around how to care for Harley, our school dog. The children have been working so hard on their creative writing skills this term and learning how to plan by using a story map and turning their plan into a final piece of writing. The children put all their skills into practice and wrote excellent 'Just So...' stories about 'How Harley Got His Bark'. Harry's story: How Harley Got His Bark


## Tiger Class update

#### **Medical reminder**



Please ensure any inhalers and Epipens which are held in school are in date.
These are kept within each class's First Aid box. This is for consistency, so all staff know where to find them when needed.
Children are only expected to carry them when off the school grounds e.g. on a trip, sports events etc.

Please remember that we are unable to administer medication, including eye drops, hayfever medication etc, unless prescribed by a GP and four doses or more per day are required. A medical form will need to be completed beforehand.

With the hotter weather coming soon, please remember to provide your child with a hat, a water bottle and ensure they have sunscreen on before they come to school. We are unable to apply sunscreen on the children, so please do not send bottles into school.
